# **NZ UNIVERSITIES**



### **WANANGA**

New Zealand's 3 wānanga provide quality education using Māori ways of teaching and learning, and in doing so contribute towards the survival and well-being of Māori as a people.


Wānanga also have an ongoing role to play in re-engaging learners into education. The iwi that support each wānanga ensure Māori philosophies, principles and approaches are incorporated into the learning environment. In person, home based learning, Certificate - Degree/Post Graduate qualifications available.

# GUARANTEED ENTRY SCORE (GES)/PREFERENTIAL ENTRY

**Some universities** use a **rank score system** for guaranteed or preferential entry (GES) into some courses of study, especially for those with limited or competitive entry. The score is based on the number of Level 3 credits gained with Excellence, Merit or Achieved.

GES scores are derived from a student's **best 80 credits** at NCEA Level 3 in up to five subjects on the approved subjects list.


Excellence = 4 points, Merit = 3 points and Achieved = 2 points.

A maximum of 24 credits in each approved subject can be counted.



# UE - look out for specific "extra" requirements

- Specific programmes may have auditions, portfolios applications are also generally earlier than other "mainstream" courses
- Some programmes may require more than the minimum eg Univ of Auckland - For those applying on the basis of NCEA:
  - You must have gained **both** the University Entrance Literacy Standard (14C) **AND** an overall score of at least **17** credits in English at Level 2 and/or 3.
- Some Science and Technical degrees may also stipulate success in particular standards through the year/in Externals as a prerequisite


# OTHER WAYS TO GET INTO UNIVERSITY (1)

#### **Discretionary entrance**

If you are under 20 years of age and do not have University Entrance, you may still be eligible for Discretionary Entrance to attend a New Zealand university.

Universities set their own discretionary entrance requirements. If you are thinking of applying, please speak with the enrolments office of the university you would like to attend.

If you applied for Discretionary Entrance but are not happy with the university's decision, you may appeal that decision to NZQA.



# OTHER WAYS TO GET INTO UNIVERSITY (2)

#### Via Polytech ....


- Completing a 1-2 yr L3/4 Certificate course
- Completing a 1-2 yr L5/6 Diploma course
- NOTE: You need to check with the Universities first be sure that they will accept this
  as a UE pathway
- Eg L6 2 year Diploma in Mechanical Engineering from Weltec to get entry into Bachelor of Engineering



# OTHER WAYS TO GET INTO UNIVERSITY (3)

**At age 20 ....** Without UE, students can apply BUT there is no guarantee of acceptance ... there will always be an interview

 What you have been doing in the interim may help ... eg working in a Rest Home for 2 years before applying for Nursing



# OTHER WAYS TO GET INTO UNIVERSITY (4)

**Bridging Courses ...** What is a bridging course?

Bridging courses can help build up your skills and meet the minimum entry requirements for a degree course. Foundation courses are usually a full year of study and are an excellent way to develop good study habits before you start your degree course, even though they don't count towards your degree.

CUP - Certificate of University Preparation

There is a cost .... A full year .... (may) use up your Fees Free ...



# Gap Year

**GAP YEAR ...** a period of time when students take a break from their studies, usually after completing secondary school or before beginning .... Further study, apprenticeship, work ...







#### What is Fees Free?

- Fees Free is a fund for first-time tertiary learners. It may cover fees for one year's study or two years' work-based training up to \$12,000.
- It's paid directly to your tertiary education organisation: a university, Te Pūkenga, a private training establishment or a wānanga
- To get Fees Free, you must meet certain eligibility criteria, and your course or programme must also be eligible.



# FEES FREE - what does it cover?

#### **Fees Free covers:**


- compulsory tuition fees
- compulsory course costs that are charged to all learners enrolled in a course, which include (but are not limited to):
- any compulsory costs associated with enrolment
- examinations (including reporting of credits to the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA))
   field trips
- any compulsory purchase of equipment or books through the tertiary education organisation (TEO)
- student services fees.

#### **STUDENT LOANS -**



A Student Loan helps to pay for your course fees (the compulsory fees charged by your education provider), study materials (eg, books, computer, travel) and living costs, **but you'll have to pay it back**.

#### STUDENT ALLOWANCES -

A Student Allowance is a weekly payment that can help with your living expenses while you're studying. The Student Allowance is similar to the <u>Student Loan living costs</u> **but you don't have to pay it back.** 



# Halls of Residence/Hostels

- A good idea/common amongst First Year students ... then flatting?
- Own room ... Shared room ... shared facilities
- "flats" with shared facilities
- Meals provided weekends 2 meals
- Most halls are close/very close/on campus
- Resident Advisor (snr Uni student)
- Study areas, recreation facilities
- Tuition support
- Social and academic community
- Reference from school needed ... <u>www.nzccrf.ac.nz</u>
- Applications close 15 Sept

COST: generally for 38/40 weeks .... (\$19,000 - \$23,500 per year)



# University study overseas ???

- Google what you might be interested in studying overseas
- Contact the university directly
- Check with the NZ based Consulate, Embassy for that country

#### Costs:

- If you have a passport for that country you could pay Domestic Fees (check the criteria for this residence? ... being able to support yourself/family connections
- If you do not have a passport, you will pay International Student fees
- Many will offer Scholarships for students from other countries
- Consider Student Exchanges (secondary school or through a NZ University.
- With NZ University exchanges, you only pay NZ study costs (1 semester or two half year or full year)
- In many exchanges, the "points" that you gain from your exchange university may be able to be credited to your NZ university programme.
